Facts

On February 1, 2008, at approximately 10:37 a.m., medallion holder Douglas Wong was arrested at 3448 Balboa St. in San Francisco for carrying: (1) a concealed dirk or dagger (Penal --Code section 12020(a)(4)), (2) a concealed firearm (Penal Code section 12025(a)), and (3) a loaded firearm in a public place or street (Penal Code section 12031(a)(1)). The firearm was a PPK automatic handgun concealed on the back of Mr. Wong's waistband with seven live rounds. He was carrying additional clips of ammunition and the dagger was carried in a sheath. At the time of the arrest, Mr. Wong was approaching the driver side door of Desoto Cab #180.

Summary Suspension of Mr. Wong's Medallion and Driver's Permit

On February 2, 2008, the Executive Director of the San Francisco Taxi Commission (the "Commission"), pursuant to Municipal Police Code section 1090(c), summarily suspended Mr. Wong's permits for reasons of public safety.

Section 1090(c) states in part: "The Chief of Police may suspend summarily any permit issued under this Article pending a disciplinary hearing before the Police Commission when in the

opinion of said Chief of Police the public health or safety requires such summary suspension."

On February 11, 2008, Mr. Wong appealed this summary suspension by letter faxed to the Taxi Commission office and signed by his attorney of record, Terence Mallinan.

III. Mr. Wonq's Testimony

At the hearing, Mr. Wong admitted that he was carrying a concealed firearm and dagger, but claims he did so because he feared for his safety. According to Mr. Wong, on January 26, 2008 (6 days before he was arrested) two of his passengers, while seated in the taxi, were approached by a drug dealer at 6th and Mission Sts. Apparently a conflict arose between the dealer and passengers at which point Mr. Wong told the passengers to get out of the car. At that time, an apparent accomplice of the dealer made threatening remarks to Mr. Wong (telling him to stay out of it; the accomplice apparently stated he knew the driver and his cab number). Since this incident, Mr. Wong has carried the firearm (owned by his brother) and dagger while driving his cab. Mr. Wong did not file a report with the police about this incident.

III. Hearing Officer's Decision

Mr. Wong admits violating Penal Code sections 12020(a)(4), 12025(a) and 12031(a)(1). Even assuming his story about the drug deal is true (and there is no independent evidence (apart Mr. Wong's testimony) which supports this story), those circumstances do not permit Mr. Wong to carry a concealed, loaded, automatic firearm and dagger. As a taxi driver, Mr. Wong serves the public. Carrying these dangerous weapons, for

whatever reason, increases the likelihood that a member of the public's safety will be compromised.

Consequently, the suspension will remain in effect. Prior to or at the disposition of the criminal charges, the Commission may reconsider whether to lift the suspension, move for revocation of Mr. Wong's permits or take other appropriate disciplinary action.
